
"Why did I get this check in the mail?"

<u>This check is a refund from your 2022 property taxes</u>. In 2022, Jefferson County received \$39.4 million in revenue above the TABOR limit and is now refunding it to Jefferson County taxpayers.*




When Jeffco receives more

Why did Jefferson County receive more revenue than the TABOR limit allows?

The county received much less revenue in 2020 due to the economic shutdown during the COVID-19 pandemic. As a result, the TABOR formula automatically lowered the revenue limit by \$14.5 million – a permanent reduction. Voters in other counties have removed that limit to allow their county to retain revenue for public services.








How do these TABOR refunds impact the Jefferson County General Fund?

Refunds coming out of the General Fund means the county has fewer dollars to invest in public safety, roads, and other essential services. This adds to the gap between our available revenue and the actual cost to provide services.
